

 From Quiescence to Phase changes (energies expressing tendencies), then Formations into Forms instantiating (into amalgams of tendencies and conditions) and enduring as they Decay and finally dissolve to return into Quiescence.

What Shakyamuni realized is that the Quiescence never disappears

- Quiescence is always present as it is within the very structures we "Identify" as separate and unique.
- This mechanism of identification is what creates for us the illusion of ownership and identity.
- Because this is really a momentary and ephemeral process, we strive and crave to hang onto what we identify as the very definition of our being.

To witness this drama of energies instantiating and dissolving without identification is to "Be" without the vicissitudes and entanglements of attachment.

This is the experience of Quiescence in the Buddha-mind.

How does this awakened mind affect our daily life?

- 1) That the illusions of self and identity, constructed of craving, are constructs of a deluded imagination and end with the death of this body (no eternal soul or self etc).
- 2) The "body" of all things is a temporary apparatus for the perception of the process.
- 3)Our minds are an emergent property of that bodily apparatus providing for us a unique opportunity to observe the very process from which all phenomena are temporarily formed or instantiated in a process that is ultimately temporary itself.
- 4) That this opportunity is as precious as it is fleeting, and not to be wasted on distractions.
- 5) The more we can awaken those other sentient minds around us, the larger our consciousness of awakening can nurture amazement and equanimity in our moment-to-moment existence.
